

The church that enters the unknown

In 2005, Hollywood director Steven Soderbergh (**Ocean's Eleven, Traffic**) released the film **Bubble.** It was a low-budget, grassroots film about a disasterous love triangle in a small town. Nothing terribly unusual or original there. What set the film apart was the way it was released.

Bubble appeared simultaneously in theatres and on cable television. The DVD release was planned for a few days later. This was a completely unorthodox way of releasing a new movie! Normally, first-run features aren't sold to television or released onto home video for six to eight months. What was the reason for this radical shift in thinking and releasing?

Dwindling box-office receipts and rampant piracy forced the producers and distributors to try something new. In an article entitled "The movie that enters the unknown" on CNN.com, director Soderbergh was quoted as saying: "The biggest thing is people having access to the movie who might not have access to it for a while. They might have read about it and they're interested, but don't live near an art cinema...or don't have a video store that carries it. This way they can get a hold of it as soon as they've heard about it."

Film and television producers aren't afraid to try something new in order to attract and interest viewers, as evidence by the unique releasing tactics of **Bubble**.

Or by such hit shows as "Games of Thrones" or "Orange Is the New Black." They are willing to risk the acceptable, to step into the unknown, in order to turn a profit.

I wonder why the church rarely has this kind of risk-taking attitude? Shouldn't the church—led by Jesus Christ and filled with the power of the Holy Spirit—be the most dynamic, progressive, dangerous and innovative thing in society? Yet we tend to be the most calcified and inflexible. What would the church (and the world!) look like if we risked more for the sake of Jesus Christ, and worried less about appearing acceptable in the eyes of society? If a Hollywood movie can break barriers with the way it's released, why can't the church break barriers with the way we do evangelism? Or preach? Or minister to others? Or worship?

I'll leave you with this quote. It comes from *A Divine Confrontation: Birth Pangs of the New Church* by Graham Cooke:


"Many of us will confess that we are more familiar with how the church works, than we are with God. ... If the church has not changed significantly in the past five to ten years, you must question its corporate relationship with God. ... God is moving us from one dimension of relationship with Him into another realm of Holy Spirit activity in church life. To bridge that gap, He is messing with our mind-sets and comfort zones. When our comfort zone is disturbed, so is our personal security. This leads us to ask questions about the foundations of our security. Is our security in what we are doing, in the familiar of church life, or locked into the heart of God?"

Is your security and faith in buildings, traditions, or comfort? Or is it in the creative, passionate, risk-taking God of eternity? Just something for us to think about as we begin a brave new year.

Prayer: Lord, help me to reach out! Amen.










Lenten devotional: Going Home
