It's said that a life without dreams is like a garden without flowers. You may call it a garden, but it's actually nothing more than a patch of dirt. The flowers make it a garden, just as dreams make up our lives. As human beings we need goals to work toward. We crave purpose. We want to know that we are part of something bigger, greater, more substantial and lasting than just ourselves. So we dream.

Children have lots of dreams. Ask them where they want to go, or what they want to do or be, and they'll tell you – usually with lots of excitement! They can imagine themselves as just about anything. Ask a teenager or college student about their dreams and you'll find them becoming a little more solid. They have more form and substance. At one point I dreamed of being a professional comic book artist. I wanted that more than anything. Unfortunately, that dream never came true for me.

It seems that as we age, our dreams diminish. Perhaps that's because we've accomplished some or all of the dreams we had when we were younger. Maybe we now have our education and a nice home. Maybe we've raised a strong family. Maybe we feel we're financially secure or we've taken trips to places we always wanted to visit. Somehow, though, as some dreams are realized and others pass away unfulfilled, we don't often replenish our dreams. We forget how to dream.

I think the church often forgets how to dream. We travel along well enough without realizing we're not aiming for something big. We get accustomed to our routines and practices and before long we suddenly realize we haven't dreamed anything great for God.

When the church forgets to dream – and dream BIG – it slips into a placid mode of maintenance. There are no longer any great hills to climb, no strongholds to storm for God's kingdom. We forget that God calls us to live in radical faith and obedience, and to pursue the things he values: justice, charity, missions, grace, love of neighbor.

I don't know what our next great dreams will be. But I do think it will come from within our committees, teams and work areas – from among the people of our congregation. I believe that a new dream will arise – one so large and unimaginable and audacious that only God can cause it to happen – and that only God can get the credit for!

What dreams do you have for our church? What would you like to see us do if God is in the midst of it? Don't be afraid to dream. One of my favorite quotes is by Ralph Waldo Emerson: *"Do not go where the path may lead. Go instead where there is no path and leave a trail..."* Let us dream together. Let us imagine the greater good we are called to in Christ Jesus. Let us leave the well-worn path of what-we-have-always-done-before and strike out into new territory. Let us remember to dream again, and to leave a trail for others to follow.

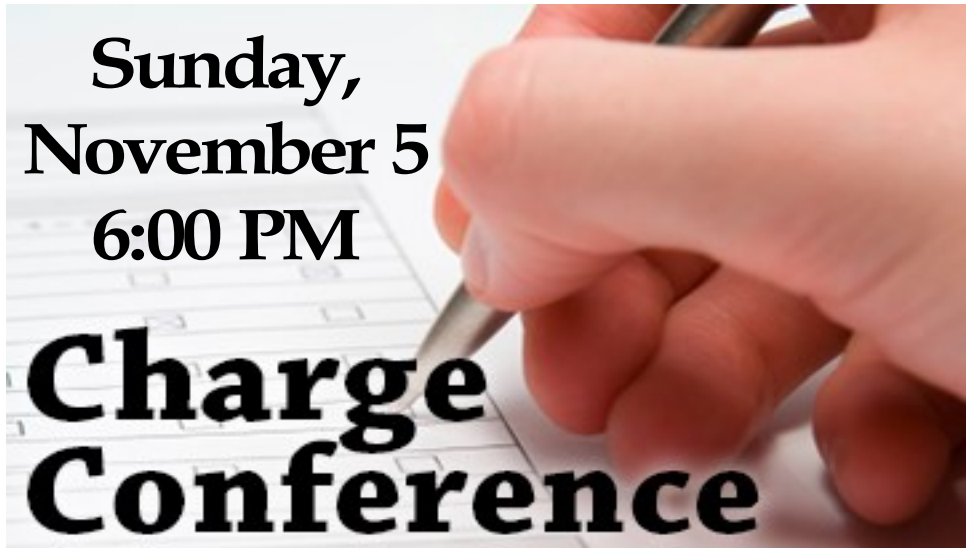

**It's time for Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes once again!**

We do not have extra boxes at this time so if you are interested in participating, you may gift wrap a shoe box and place the items in it. You can also put your items in a bag (please label it "shoebox ministry") and leave it on the pew in the fellowship hall. We'll be getting more boxes soon and we will put the items in the boxes. ***The guidelines for preparing a box have changed, so please see the picture below for new instructions.***



**How to pack your shoe box**

- 1** Assemble this box by following the step-by-step instructions below.
- 2** Determine whether your gift will be for a boy or a girl, and the child's age category: 2-4, 5-9, or 10-14. You may obtain standard boy/girl labels online or download a Follow Your Box label to learn the destination of your shoe box gift at [www.samaritanspurse.org/occ](http://www.samaritanspurse.org/occ). Mark the label and tape it to the top of your box.
- 3** Please include toys, school supplies, and hygiene items. Do not include used items, war-related toys, chocolate or perishable foods, liquids, medicine, or breakable items.
- 4** Please donate **\$7** or more for each shoe box you prepare to help cover shipping and other project costs. You may include the donation in the box or donate online when you print your Follow Your Box label at [www.samaritanspurse.org/occ](http://www.samaritanspurse.org/occ).
- 5** Place a rubber band around each closed shoe box and drop off at the Collection Center nearest you during National Collection Week in mid-November.
